Last Friday, St. Joseph's held an Indigenous Incursion Day celebrating in preparation for Reconciliation Week. Reconciliation Week started on Sunday May 27 and continues to June 3rd with the theme for this year being 'Now More Than Ever".

The day commenced with students from ASHE (Academy of Sports, Health and Education) conducting a welcome to country and smoking ceremony immersing the whole school in ancient traditions. This was followed by our F.I.R.E Carrier Commissioning which saw 10 students stepping up being commissioned as F.I.R.E Carriers to continue the journey to reconciliation.

The Middles e njoyed a program learning more about indigenous culture and history, with a hands-on opportunity to touch and hold indigenous artifacts along with some great demonstrations by the team from ASHE. The students were more than happy to become living canvases with traditional dot paintings completing the great learning experience.

The day concluded with St. Francis Nathalia being welcomed to our school with both school walking through a smoking ceremony to cleanse the players in preparation for the Dreamtime Games with football and netball being played. Some great games followed with St. Francis taking honor's in the football and grade 6 netball. Congratulations to our grade 5 netball team for coming home with the win.

The Resilience Project is committed to teaching positive mental health strategies to prevent mental ill-health **RESILIENCE Internal nearth strategies to prevent mental m-nearth** and build young people's capacity to deal with adversity. Teachers and students will engage in weekly lessons and activities around the key principles of Gratitude, Empathy,

Mindfulness (GEM), and Emotional Literacy to build resilience.

Preps

It is hard to believe that in just over four weeks' time, our Prep students will have completed half of their first year at school. They have had an amazing Term Two of learning, and we have seen so much growth and development, particularly in the areas of Reading, Writing and Numbers.

Literacy

In Reading, students have been continuing their Sounds Write work and teacher led tasks. Our Prep students have also been focusing upon the importance of sounding out tricky words, but not sounding out words they already know with the goal of improving reading fluency. As always, it is very important that the children practice their reading at home each day to consolidate what they are learning at school and that they are getting their diaries signed.

In Writing, students have been learning about how to create sentences that make sense, include appropriate punctuation, and a Noun and Verb. They have been encouraged to apply their letter/sound knowledge to sound out unknown words, to write common words and reread their writing for meaning. They have also been working on correct letter formation, pencil grip and posture. We have been seeing some excellent results in writing this term!

Numeracv

In Numeracy, students have continued their daily counting to 100 or higher and skip counting by 10's, 5's and 2's. They have been matching the number name, numeral and collection of objects. They have been using concrete materials to solve addition, subtraction and sharing problems. Next week, the students will begin to learn about Money. They will explore what money is, what we use it for and what the value of different coins and notes are. If you have any special coins or money from different countries that you would like to send along, it would be great to be able to share and talk about this.

Religion

In Religion, students have been focusing on the unit 'God knows us and loves us.' Students have been exploring the ways in which God loves us and understanding that God's love can be revealed through our families, friends and creation.

Inquiry

In Inquiry, students have been learning about the past verses today, including topics such as housing, schools, vehicles and technology. We also celebrated Reconciliation Week where we completed lessons



about cultural awareness and knowledge of our first Australians. We met as a whole school and welcomed our F.I.R.E Carriers for 2024, including a smoking ceremony. F.I.R.E stands for Friends Igniting Reconciliation through Education.

Juniors

Entering Winter

We have been fortunate with the weather this Term and children have been able to get out each day to play. As Winter, approaches we encourage children to wear jumpers and even jackets as it gets colder. Please ensure these items are clearly named as we have already had many lost this Term.

<u>Inquiry</u>

We continue with our study of the History. We have looked at Transport, Games, Toys and Cooking. Children have marveled at the ways things were done in the past, and even not that long ago. It has been interesting looking at Technology and why we have new inventions and make inventions. A lot of which came back to making it quicker and easier for humans (the most recent one being Robot Vacuum Cleaners). Children got a work-out comparing electric beaters to the old hand beaters.



Literacy - Letter Writing

After our trip to the Historical Society, we still had some questions. This was a perfect opportunity to send some letters to older members of our community. We have received some wonderful letters from the residents of Karinya and patients at the Numurkah Hospital. We cheered them up on Mother's Day weekend as we asked if they could be given to those who rarely have visitors. The children are delighted to share them with each other and feel such a sense of pride that they have made a difference in someone's life. Miss O's Mum took our letters and read them to residents from Echuca Community of the Aged. She said that the letters brightened the day of many residents and started a lot of conversations between the residents, happily remembering their childhood and having many laughs about what they got up to. Below are some snippets of what the residents had to say.

• Miss O's Mum found it funny that we found the false teeth amusing at the Historical Society, as a lot of the elderly people have false teeth. "The residents are all very happy to hear that you're learning about history."

• Marcia said "The biggest change that I have seen is that there isn't enough kindness in the world anymore"

• Robyn said "I loved reading your letters and it brought back lots of happy memories from when I was a child.

• Jim "I grew up in an old hotel with a cellar in Echuca and was raised by my grandmother. At home we would have to light the fire to get hot water to have a wash. On cold nights we would heat a brick in the oven and wrap it in a towel for warmth" "Our after school snack consisted of bread and dripping with salt and pepper and sauce on it"

• Pat "We had a well that we pumped to get water" "We had long drop toilets and the Grade 6 boys had to empty them.

• Frank "One of the biggest changes has been technology" As kids we would ride our bikes to Ardmona and pick some grapes and would get chased out by the owners" "During the 1939 floods we had to take our shoes and socks off and walk along the fences to get to school".







Keen writers!

Sharing our letters with the Preps.

We are now moving on to Persuasive Writing and some of our Topics have been very enjoyable like "Year Twos are the Best Year Level in the School!" which did not go down well with the Year Ones!! "Would you rather be a Mermaid or a Dragon?" also got students fired up.

Numeracy

We are finishing our topic on Pattern and Algebra. Students have explored and created many different patterns using rules. These concepts of patterns have now been transferred to working with numbers and skip counting. This is a terrific foundation for when we cover Multiplication and Arrays later in the year.



Religion

We are looking at Jesus in the Scriptures and it ties in beautifully with our Inquiry Topic. The Gospels in the Bible were written by authors who wanted Jesus to be remembered in a special way. They tell us stories about what Jesus said and did. They tell us about when he was born, who were his friends and what he said.

Homework

Phonics

A reminder that children have a phonics book with weekly focus words for children to practice at home. We encourage children to write these words at least twice a week.

Reading Logs

We ask that all students please read to an adult every night. Once completed, please write the title and a small comment in their reader diary.

Ideas for reading at home together - before reading, predict the story, look through the illustrations using the language in the book, stop halfway and share what you think might happen next, check your predictions at the end. Finally ask your child to retell the story by checking comprehension. This year our Reading Logs have daily questions related to The Resilience Project. We love reading little notes left around the Daily GEM chat topic. Some of our students are loving the Reward system tracking for the number of nights reading.





Specialist

Students have specialist classes on <u>Wednesdays</u>. Children need to continue to wear their <u>sports uniform</u> every Wednesday and Friday. They also need to bring their Library bag each Wednesday.

Numeracy:

This term, our Middles are diving deep into Numeracy. They're putting in hard work to grasp multiplication and division strategies, aiming to boost their Math's Ninja levels and solidify their multiplication facts.



Literacy:

In Literacy, students are engaged in Sounds-Write groups, refining their language skills and



exploring narrative structures. They're also gearing up for the Public Speaking Competition, drawing inspiration from classic fairytale characters.

<u>Inquiry</u>:

Our history studies this term revolve around World War 1 and World War 2, connecting global events to local and family histories. We've had enriching experiences, including virtual visits to the Australian War Memorial and hands-on exploration of wartime artifacts.

Numeracy:

We have recently begun a new topic in Numeracy; the students will be delving into Units of Measurement. The students will have many opportunities to think critically and creatively through this unit, as well as engage in some collaborative learning.

Literacy:

We have continued our novel study on "Wonder" and continue to dive into the rich personal and social learning opportunities within the text. It has been great listening to student discussions around the characters and their experiences, unpacking this through their writing. As the novel draws to a close we are excited to see what the students have taken away from this journey.

Inquiry:

Our study on Local History with Jeff Blackley has now been completed. The students explored all things Numurkah, dating back to 1875. We would like to thank Jeff for all the hard work and effort he put into providing the students with rich learning opportunities in and out of the classroom. We will now be moving our attention to the Australian Gold Rush period. The students will learn about the importance of the Gold Rush and its impact on Victoria.

Winter Sports:

The students have done a fantastic job participating in our winter sports program. This has recently involved playing in the Divisional School Championship in Mooroopna. Both the Football and Netball team did a super job competing hard and in the right spirit. We also played St. Francis Primary School in a special Indigenous Cultural Round. It was a fantastic day with all students enjoying themselves. The Softball students are still waiting eagerly for the opportunity to play against another school, hopefully the chance presents itself in the following weeks.
